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There are 310,000 patients receiving Clinical Homecare services in the UK, many include delivery of high cost and/or specialist medicines with wrap-around patient support services. With current market value in excess of £2.6bn and push towards out-of-hospital care this is expected to continue to grow.

NCHA is excited to announce the confirmed programme for our 2018 Annual Conference – Tackling Unspoken Issues. With the continued expansion of the Clinical Homecare Sector, high quality and governance standards have been set and are being implemented across NHS Trusts, Commissioners, pharmaceutical manufacturers and commercial Homecare Providers. NCHA is working closely with NHS colleagues to ensure patients receive high quality and consistent Homecare Services. The Homecare Leads for England, Scotland and Wales and a number of the NHS Regional Homecare Specialists and representatives from pharmaceutical industry are joining us as speakers to share their expertise and experience.

Programme Overview

The first session will focus on the overall impact of Clinical Homecare Services on the NHS. Initially from the perspective of the patient, then looking at the development of Out-Patient Antimicrobial Treatment (OPAT) Services to manage these patients at home, rather than as hospital in-patients and the impact that has on overall outcomes and antibiotic resistance. We then explain the differences (and similarities) between homecare service and outsourced out-patient dispensing to give a greater understanding of why homecare services continue to expand despite the differences between the various medicine supply channels becoming increasingly blurred. Joe Bassett will describe how Clinical Homecare Services are robustly monitored and benchmarked for quality and service levels and highlight how the NHS and homecare providers are learning from that data.

We compare and contrast the approaches to Homecare Services between England, Scotland and Wales with the three NHS National Homecare Leads discussing their views on the robustness of the homecare sector and how real and perceived challenges can be addressed. Currently around 80% of homecare services are funded by the pharmaceutical manufacturer to ensure robust supply chains to patient and increasing numbers of homecare patients are supported by Patient Support Programmes and NICE approved Patient Access Schemes. We will hear differing views from NHS colleagues, Homecare Providers and Pharma Manufacturers – but we all want what is the best experience and outcomes for patients. Throughout the conference programme, we will focus on patient experiences of Homecare Services now and in the future.

We will receive an update on the strategically important issues of ensuring there are sufficient nurses and other clinical homeworkers and sufficient aseptic compounding capacity to match demands of increasing numbers of homecare patients. A particularly thorny issue as these capacity issues apply across the NHS, not just in homecare services. We will also seek to address the more general concerns about capacity within the homecare sector. The day will finish with the Keynote address.
